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Instructional Plan

Part 1: Use the following resources to create an annotated map of recent conflicts:

- [Eight “Hot Wars” During the Cold War](#)
- [Understanding Northern Ireland’s ‘Troubles’](#)
- Conflicts: Korea, Cuba, Vietnam, Congo, Nicaragua, Chile, Angola, Afghanistan, Northern Ireland
- Directions: Locate, label, and identify the following information for each conflict:
 - Country name/region
 - Year(s) of conflict
 - Intrastate or interstate conflict
 - Was it a proxy war?
 - Main reason for conflict

Part 2: Use the following resources to add to your annotated map of recent conflicts:

- Resource Conflicts: cocoa, diamond, gold, lithium, oil, poppy, timber, water
- Directions: Locate, label, and identify the country listed under each resource conflict example. Include:
